4. **Size and Form:** The size and form of the specimens will be assessed. This includes evaluating the size relative to the species' standard, as well as the overall form, symmetry, and proportion of flowers and foliage.
5. **Colour and Contrast:** Judges will look at the colours and contrasts within the specimens. Entries that demonstrate pleasing colour combinations, contrast between flowers and foliage, and overall visual impact.
6. **Stem and Foliage:** The quality and condition of stems and foliage will be considered. Stems should be sturdy and free from damage, while foliage should be lush, green, and complementary to the flowers.
7. **Presentation:** The presentation of the floral specimens is crucial. Judges will consider factors such as cleanliness, grooming of plants, appropriate containers or vases, proper labelling (if applicable), and overall aesthetic appeal of the display.
8. **Cultural Practices:** The cultivation and care practices used to grow the specimens will be evaluated. Entries that demonstrate good horticultural practices, such as proper watering, fertilization, pruning, and pest control, may receive recognition.
9. **Uniqueness and Rarity:** Entries that include rare or uncommon floral specimens, unusual varieties, or exotic species may receive recognition for their uniqueness and contribution to biodiversity.
10. **Overall Impression:** Judges will consider the overall impression of the floral specimen's display, taking into account all the above criteria to determine how well-rounded, diverse, visually striking, and professionally presented the entries are compared to others.

These criteria aim to encourage participants to showcase the best quality and diversity of floral specimens, highlight their horticultural skills, and create visually stunning displays that captivate the audience and judges alike.
